Opening Remarks by Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney

First Order of Business: Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. presented a plaque to Past Commander-in-Chief Paul Gramling, Jr. commemorating his service as Commander-in-Chief for the past two years.

Second Order of Business: Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. acknowledged the hard work of Executive Director Adam T. Southern and the Ladies on his staff for their hard work of moving in and setting up the museum for the General Executive Council Meeting and the Jefferson Davis Statue Dedication.

Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. presented the members of the General Executive Council and his Appointed Staff Members with their Document of Commission to their respective position.

Third Order of Business: Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. entertained a motion to accept the Post Reunion and three Teleconference General Executive Council Minutes. ATM Councilman Robert Edwards asked if corrections had been made and Adjutant-in-Chief Dan McCaskill acknowledged minor corrections had been made to the minutes. ATM Councilman Robert Edwards made a motion to accept the minutes as corrected; Past Commander-in-Chief Paul Gramling, Jr. seconded the motion; motion passed.

Fourth Order of Business: Executive Director Adam T. Southern gave a report on the status of the membership and a report of the financial standing of the Confederation.

Discussion during Executive Director Adam T. Southern's Membership and Financial Report, the following motions and actions were made and acted upon.

Motion: ANV Councilman Chris Sullivan made a motion to appropriate \$5,000 from the Heritage Defense Fund that can be expended at any time with the approval of the Commander-in-Chief, Adjutant-in-Chief and Chief of Heritage Operations. The motion was seconded by AOT Councilman Carl Jones. Motion passed.

During the discussion concerning the Confederate Museum, concern was raised by ATM Councilman Robert Edwards that there was a need to develop a plan on how to display the Museums artifacts. Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. asked ATM Councilman Robert Edwards to chair a committee with the suggested designation as the Display and Artifacts Committee and authorized ATM Councilman Robert Edwards to select his committee members to develop a plan with estimates and report back to the General Executive Council in March.

Motion: a motion was made by Lt. Commander-in-Chief Jason Boshers to charge the Investment Committee to research the time frame, penalties and costs of moving investments to another Firm before transfer of funds and report to the General Executive Council. The motion was seconded by Chief of Staff Darrell Maples. Motion passed.

Motion: a motion was made by Past Commander-in-Chief Paul Gramling, Jr. to lift the moratorium on funds used as collateral for the Museum in compliance with the time frame by Heritage Bank that said funds would be released 30-days from the date on the Certificate of Occupancy (10-02-2020) which will be November 2, 2020.
Motion seconded by AOT Commander Jimmy Hill. Motion passed.

Motion: with the uncertainties of the Nations markets, ANV Councilman Chris Sullivan moved that the Investment Committee consults with the Financial Advisors as to whether our investment strategies need to be changed for the coming year and report to the General Executive Council in 60 days. Motion seconded by AOT Councilman Carl Jones. Motion passed.

Fifth Order of Business: Confederate Museum Update - Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. informed The General Executive Council that the requested report had not been received and Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. would call the person responsible and setup a teleconference so The General Executive Council could hear the report.

Sixth Order of Business: Property Report - Lt. Commander-in-Chief Jason Boshers went through the list of current properties owned by the Confederation and discussed the liability only premium associated with each piece of property and the prospect of selling any property if it has no historical significance and with no conditions attached. A list of the properties is attached to these minutes.

Motion: a motion was made by ATM Councilman Robert Edwards that each Division pay 25% of the Annual Liability Premium on properties located in their respective Division with a maximum of \$100. Seconded by Chaplain-in-Chief Dr. Herman White. The **motion was withdrawn** and the matter tabled except the prospective sale of Parcels 3 and 4 until the Spring General Executive Council Meeting.

ATM Councilman Robert Edwards agreed to act as Agent of the Confederation to sell Parcels # 3 and # 4 at the best price possible and the money from the sale would go toward paying the debt on the Confederate Museum.

Seventh Order of Business: the Missouri Division petitioned the General Executive Council to place the Neosho Monument / Grave on the Confederation insurance policy.

Motion: a motion was made by Chief of Staff Darrell Maples to place the monument under the National Liability Umbrella policy. The motion was seconded by AOT Commander Jimmy Hill. The motion passed.

Eighth Order of Business: Beautification Projects – Lt. Commander-in-Chief Jason Boshers presented two Projects to beautify Elm Springs and the Confederate Museum, sale of memorial park benches and memorial bricks and pavers for walkways.

The cost of benches as quoted by Lebanon Monument of Lebanon, TN will be \$ 1,140.00 per bench. Proposed selling prices on the floor are \$2,000; \$1,800 or \$ 1,500.

Motion: a motion was made by Chief of Heritage Ops Walter D. Kennedy to set the retail price for the benches for \$1,800 based on the current cost quote of \$1,140. The motion was seconded by Chaplain-in-Chief Dr. Herman White. The motion passed.

Bricks R Us quoted the cost for 4x8 inch bricks at \$19 and the cost of the 8x8 inch paver at \$29.50. The Suggested selling price is \$50 for the brick and \$100 for the paver. No upfront money will be provided. Bricks and pavers would be ordered at a certain level of those items ordered.

Motion: a motion was made by ATM Councilman Robert Edwards to allow the sale of 4x8 inch memorial bricks at \$50 per brick and the 8x8 inch memorial paver at \$100 per paver. The motion seconded by Past Commander-in-Chief Paul Gramling, Jr. The motion passed.

Ninth Order of Business: 501(c)(4) Update - Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. gave ANV Councilman Chris Sullivan the floor to present an update on a 501(c)(4) to the General Executive Council and whether the Confederation should pursue forming a 501(c)(4).

Motion: AOT Councilman Carl Jones made the motion for the General Executive Committee to continue evaluation of the formation of a 501(c)(4) for the Confederation. Seconded by Chief of Heritage Operations Walter D. Kennedy. Motion passed.

Tenth Order of Business: the Major William Footman Camp # 1950 in Cape Coral, FL requests the endorsement of the General Executive Council to pursue civil litigation against the person who toppled the bust of Gen. Robert E. Lee in Fort Meyers, FL.

Motion: ANV Commander Kevin Stone made the motion to endorse the Major William Footman Camp # 1950 to pursue civil litigation against the person who toppled the bust of Gen. Robert E. Lee in Fort Meyers, FL. Seconded by Past Commander-in-Chief Kelly Barrow. Motion passed.

Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. tabled the request from Mississippi Division Commander Conor Bond for Twitch approval for SCV support from the General Executive Council and Commander Bond's report on the SCV Fraternity on the Ole Miss Campus due to his recovering from covid-19. This item of business could be addressed at future teleconference.

Eleventh Order of Business: Membership Application Update - Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. brought to the attention of the General Executive Council that men were joining the Sons of Confederate Veterans who have not been probably vetted and that the application needed a Statement showing that the Applicant had been properly vetted by the Camp. Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. asked the Chairman of the Genealogy Committee, J. C. Hanna to have the Committee review the Application and report to the General Executive Council at its next meeting with proposed changes to the SCV Membership Application and guidelines for vetting a new applicant.

Members joining other Camps as Supplemental Members and the possibility of being counted toward a Camp's Delegation was raised as a concern. Past Commander-in-Chief Paul Gramling, Jr. stated there were enough safeguards already in place.

Twelfth Order of Business: Social Media Policy - Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. requested Comments from the General Executive Council on the proposed Social Media Policy. Tabled for further research and a later teleconference.

Thirteenth Order of Business: Condemning Racism Statement on the Website - After a brief discussion, Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. decided to table the issue for further research until the Spring General Executive Council Meeting.

Fourteenth Order of Business: Update the Camp Handbook - Past Commander-in-Chief Kelly Barrow worked with Editor Frank Powell to update the Camp Handbook to comply with procedural changes made by the General Executive Committee over the years and to incorporate suggested corrections submitted by members of the General Executive Council.

Motion: ANV Commander Kevin Stone made the motion to accept the updated Camp Handbook as corrected. The motion was seconded by AOT Councilman Carl Jones. Motion passed.

Fifteenth Order of Business: Stephen D. Lee Award- Past Commander-in-Chief Kelly Barrow stated there was an update to the procedures for awarding of the Stephen D. Lee Award. Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. asked Commander Barrow to pass the procedural change to the Awards Committee Chairman.

Sixteenth Order of Business: "The Charge" policy - Past Commander-in-Chief Kelly Barrow asked that the General Executive Council adopt the official "Charge" and require all Divisions, Brigades and Camps to incorporate this version of the Charge into their respective Constitution/By-Laws.

Motion: Judge Advocate-in-Chief Scott Hall made the motion that the General Executive Council adopt the official "Charge" and require all Divisions, Brigades and Camps to incorporate this version of the Charge into their respective Constitution/By-Laws. Seconded by Chief of Heritage Operations Walter D. Kennedy. Motion passed.

Commander-in-Chief Larry McCluney, Jr. asked for a motion to go into Executive Session to deal with disciplinary issues and employee compensation with the caveat that the Sergeant-at-Arms, Frank Heathman, Tim Steadman and Adam Southern remain.

Motion: to go into Executive Session was made by Chaplain-in-Chief Dr. Herman White at 11:49 am and was seconded by ATM Councilman Robert Edwards. Motion passed.

Motion: to come out of Executive Session was made by AOT Commander Jimmy Hill at 12:51 pm and was seconded by Past Commander-in-Chief Paul Gramling, Jr. . Motion passed.

Motion: a motion was made by Past Commander-in-Chief Paul Gramling, Jr. to adjourn the meeting of the General Executive Council. Seconded by Lt. Commander-in-Chief Jason Boshers. Motion passed.

The meeting was closed with a prayer and blessing from Chaplain-in-Chief Dr. Herman White at 12:59.

Proposal for Park Benches
10/10/2020

To maintain a uniform look around the property and to beautify the property; it would be beneficial to have matching park benches around the SCV property that would provide a place for people to sit while visiting. I have attached two pictures below of the two benches already placed in the Jefferson Davis Memorial Garden.

History: These benches were done by Lafayette Monument Company. In an email dated May 27, 2020; the quote was \$1,612.00 per bench; which included \$1,490 for the bench plus the base, engraving, transportation and installation. So, \$1,612.00 installed.

I have gotten a better price.



Current: I contacted Lebanon Monument in Lebanon, TN. They have worked on multiple monuments for Murfreesboro Camp #33. I have attached the email which states a retail cost of \$1,425 which includes any engraving, delivery and installation. However, because we are a nonprofit and they are going to give us a 20% discount; the cost would be \$1,140.

We would not have to pre-order any benches. Each bench would be order as they were purchased. Lebanon Monument Company would only work with SCV National. We have no up-front cost and the sample is already on site in the garden. We sell the benches as a fundraiser. The benches could go up anywhere on the property including out by the flagpole and the walking trails.

Proposal #1: We sell them for \$1,500 which is a \$360 profit. Pro: Not as expensive and the possibility of selling more. Con: As cost fluctuate, profit margin will decline and we could have to adjust the price more often accordingly to the market to maintain a consistent profit margin.

Proposal #2: We sell them for \$1,800 which is a \$660 profit. Pro: Larger profit margin means more money plus fewer adjustments to maintain profit margin as the cost fluctuate. Con: Might not sell as many.

2,000 \$660 profit

Additional decisions: How many would we allow on the property? Where would they be placed? What would be the minimum profit margin?

Example: If we allow 20 benches with a \$500 profit placed on the property; the profit would be \$13,200.

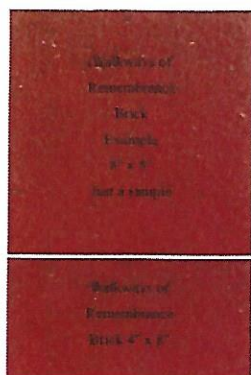

Brick Fund-Raiser:

The purpose of this fund-raiser (in addition to raising funds for the SCV and its projects) is to easily allow guests to visit the Todd/Looney Family Cemetery and the burial site of Lt. Simeon Cummings by means of a sidewalk. The small family cemetery sits approximately 150' away from the new walkway connecting Elm Springs to the National Confederate Museum.

The proposed cemetery walk would connect to the museum/Elm Springs walkway. From "Bricks-R-Us," engraved bricks are \$19. These could be sold for \$50 to help cover the installation and concrete work required while still raising funds to be used elsewhere.



There are several different bricks to choose from when doing such a project; there are also several different fund-raising brick companies from which to choose. With Bricks-R-Us (www.bricksrus.com), bricks begin at \$19 and go up depending on size and materials.

Just as there are multiple brick companies and brick options, there are just as many sidewalk styles to choose from. The concrete walk leading from the museum to Elm Springs is all concrete and measures 8' wide. The example below incorporates the brick of the historic home and the concrete of the adjoining walkway. This walkway would be of poured concrete with a 4' center section. On either side of the center section is a 16" space for bricks. Another 8" band of concrete would be added to ensure that the bricks will remain tightly in place. Altogether, this would make for a sidewalk 8' wide.

Approximately 150' long and with 32" width for bricks, this will allow for approximately 1,800 bricks (\$90,000). If the walkway was extended to forty feet to the left to include a walkway to Lt. Simeon Cummings' grave, it would add approximately 480 bricks to the project (or \$24,000).





Costs:

A rough estimate is that the walkway from the side of Elm Springs to the Todd/Looney Cemetery and Lt. Simeon Cummings' grave will include 2,280 bricks. The finished bricks are \$19 each with free shipping.

$$2,280 \times \$19 = \$43,320$$

The price of the concrete work and preparation work is also an added expense. According to homewyse.com, a concrete sidewalk installation in Columbia, Tennessee is estimated at \$9.64 a sq./ft.

$$190\text{ft long} \times 8\text{ft wide} = 1,520\text{SF}$$

The length from the “Yellow Brick Road” to the cemetery is 150 feet. If we brick a path 4 feet wide and 150 feet long, using just the 4x8 bricks, it is approximately 2,700 bricks. At a cost of \$31 per brick, the profit is \$83,700.
